

10-year-old boy helps sister with autism, wins toy contest

Kusa Xiong has looked out for his big sister his whole life.

At school, he helps her unpack her things at her locker. At home, they read together and make up games. They practice counting together, too.

Kusa is 10 years old. His sister, Pahnuly, is 12. Pahnuly has autism. People with autism often have trouble talking with others. They might repeat things over and over, or be interested in only one subject.

It was because of Pahnuly that Kusa came up with a winning idea one day. The family was playing ping-pong, which is hard for Pahnuly. Kusa wanted to find a way to make it easier for her to play.

"When she scores," he said, "she dances."



Important For Siblings To Play Together

Jennifer Reinke works at the Autism Society of Minnesota. Reinke said that it's important for people with autism and their siblings to play together.

Play helps build important skills, she said. It teaches kids to work together, take turns and feel empathy. Empathy is when someone is able to understand how another person feels and share in that feeling.

Kusa's idea won a national toy contest. He will get a \$2,500 scholarship. A scholarship is money that you can use for college. Kusa will also make money for every game that is sold. This month, Kusa will travel to New York City to see his game on display at a major toy fair.

"My son just wants my daughter to have fun, too," said Kusa's dad.

Frustrated With Ping-Pong

The idea came to Kusa in 2016. Pahnuly was frustrated with ping-pong, and Kusa wanted to help her practice hitting. Kusa asked his dad to help him hang a ping-pong ball from a door frame.



At first, Pahnuly wasn't interested. But soon, Kusa heard a sound coming from the front room: Clack, clack, clack.

The family made a frame for the ball. Then they came up with rules and ways to score points.

Word spread at school about Kusa's game. His teacher, Kristin Stasica, asked him to tell his class about Aeropong. Kusa is usually shy. But when he talked about his game, his face lit up with excitement, Stasica said.

"Simple Genius"

Mark Carson is one of the founders of Fat Brain Toys, an educational toy and game company. His company ran the contest that Kusa won. Carson called Kusa's game "simple genius."

Kusa's family loves Aeropong. They wear matching T-shirts with the game's name on the front. The family has also made YouTube videos of the two children playing. Pahnuly watches the online clips nearly every day. At the end of one clip, she jumps up and down. She is celebrating winning at Aeropong against her dad. She waves her pink cat paddle in the air. Cats are Pahnuly's favorite animal.



Sister Sparks Ideas For Other Inventions

Kusa dreams of becoming an inventor and a businessman one day. He said his big sister has already sparked ideas for other inventions.

"Most products are created by accident," Kusa said. "But there has to be a reason Aeropong came to us."
